

WHITE GOODS DISPOSAL

The Wilder Maintenance Department will be picking up white goods such as Refrigerators, Air Conditioners, etc., which contain freon and cannot be picked up with your regular waste collection service on May 21st. If you choose to have the item picked up by Rumpke you must have the freon removed and complete the required form which is available at the city building.

Any other large item can be picked up with your regular waste collection. If you do have a large item for pick-up, please contact Rumpke at 877-786-7537 so that they can have two people on the truck for that pick-up.

If you have a white goods item that contains freon, you must contact the city building (581-8884) by May 19th @ 3:00 p.m., to advise of the item and to be placed on the pick-up list between 8:00 AM & 3:00 PM.

This needs to be done so that the Maintenance Department can make proper arrangements.

MARCH IS SEVERE WEATHER PREPAREDNESS MONTH

THE Wilder Fire Department, in conjunction with the Campbell County Emergency Management office and the National Weather Service would like to keep our citizens safe during the spring months. The following tips will keep you and your family safe in the event of a strong storm or tornado.

• In a home or building, move to a pre-designated shelter, such as a basement.

• If an underground shelter is not available, move to an interior room or hallway on the lowest floor and get under a sturdy piece of furniture.

Stay away from windows.

• If you are caught outdoors, seek shelter in a basement, shelter or sturdy building. If you cannot quickly walk to a shelter:

O Immediately get into a vehicle, buckle your seat belt and try to drive to the closest sturdy shelter.

If flying debris hits your vehicle while you are driving, pull over and park.

Now you have the following options as a last resort:

O Stay in the car with the seat belt on. Put your head down below the windows, covering with your hands and a blanket if possible.

O If you can safely get noticeably lower than the level of the roadway, exit your car and lie in that area, covering your head with your hands.

O Your choice should be driven by your specific circumstances. Mobile homes, even if tied down, offer little protection from tornadoes and should be abandoned.

Occasionally, tornadoes develop so rapidly that advance warning is not possible. Remain alert for signs of an approaching tornado. Flying debris from tornadoes causes most deaths and injuries

We also encourage you and your family to have an emergency disaster supply kit handy during these times. They should include, but not limited to the following:

O A 3-day supply of water (one gallon per person per day) and food that won't spoil

O one change of clothing and footwear per person

O one blanket or sleeping bag per person

O a first-aid kit, including prescription medicines

O emergency tools, including a battery-powered NOAA Weather Radio and a portable radio, flashlight, and plenty of extra batteries

O an extra set of car keys and a credit card or cash special items for infant, elderly, or disabled family members. We, the members of the Wilder Fire Department, would like to thank you for your constant support and appreciation. At the City Building

EAT IN OR CARRY OUT CALL 431-5884 FOR PHONE ORDERS to breed and have larger litters. Coyotes will also quickly fill into vacated habitat from adjacent areas. For these reasons eradication efforts frequently lead to increases in local coyote populations.

Reducing Human-Coyote Conflicts

- Never deliberately **feed a coyote** or other wild mammal.
- Securely cover garbage cans and compost bins.
- Remove fallen fruit from yards.

• Eliminate opportunities for rats to breed in and around your yard.

• Never deliberately approach a coyote and teach children to respect all wildlife from a distance.

• Keep house pets indoors and allow only controlled access to the outdoors (fenced yards and leashes). Always keep pets in from dusk to dawn when coyotes are most active.

• To prevent coyotes from entering your yard consider **remov**ing unnecessary brush, installing a motion-sensitive lighting system, or installing a coyote proof fence. To be effective fences must be at least six feet tall, have no openings greater than four inches and should extend flush with the ground.

If you do not want coyotes around your home, **let them know that they are not welcome**. If you see a coyote, shout and make noise, wave your arms.
