

We hope you have a safe and happy summer!


NOTE TO PARENTS:

Barbecue grills, turkey fryers and fire pits must be at least 15 feet away from structures when in use. Never use grills or fire pits under porches or overhangs. They should not be placed near a structure until completely cooled. Allow ashes from grills and firepits to completely burn out and cool prior to discarding them and please never place ashes on your deck or in any combustible type bags.

Drive Safe to Arrive Safe!

Throughout my career I've seen countless avoidable accidents. If only drivers would adhere to a couple simple safe driving habits, they could have been avoided. Of course, one of the main factors is always speed but today we see more and more accidents contributed to distracted driving. Whether it's talking on the phone, texting or trying to find a good song on your playlist, there seems to be less focus on driving and more on our personal lives when we get behind the wheel. Please understand the enormous amount of responsibility we all take on every time we operate a vehicle, although many seem to take this for granted. Not only do we owe it to ourselves but our families and everyone else on the road to be responsible and safe when driving. So, the first tip, as obvious as it may sound, is please pay attention at all times.

Another simple safety tip is, stop following too close. Try to remember your driver's manual and back off to a safe distance (2 seconds) when a vehicle is in front of you. To put in perspective, at thirty five (35) miles per hour, you are traveling nearly fifty (50) feet per second. Just imagine what can happen in such a short period covering that distance. There are countless occasions I'm not even able to see the front headlights of the vehicle behind me, in my rearview mirror. Obviously,

this is entirely too close and causes numerous senseless accidents that are easily avoidable.

Finally, I want to mention a very important safety tip, which will help prevent many senseless and avoidable accidents. We all need to yield to stopped emergency vehicles and for that matter even disabled motorists on the side of the road. Fortunately, this is now a law but in my opinion it shouldn't have had to be. When you see an emergency vehicle stopped at road side, you are obligated to change lanes or slow to a safe speed if you cannot safely make the lane change. Unfortunately, numerous pedestrians and emergency personnel are killed every year throughout the country, being struck by passing vehicles. First responders risk their lives on a daily basis but, these situations should not be one of those risks.

So, if you can adhere to just a few tips that will ultimately become safe driving habits, you, your families and everyone else on the road around you will be much safer when operating a vehicle on our roadways today. I truly hope you really think about these suggestions and impart them on to your children, other family members and even friends.

STEEL PLANT NOISE

The city has been receiving a number of calls recently regarding noise at the steel plant. The steel plant is a heavy industrial business vital to the city and the Northern Kentucky economy. Unfortunately a byproduct of this type of business is noise. Working together on a solution to satisfy all involved is a goal of both the city and steel plant.

The city and management at the steel plant are committed to find and abate as much of the noise as possible. In order for the steel plant to isolate the areas, time, days and processes making the noise the city and the steel plant are asking that complaints about noise be directed to the guard office at the TMK-IPSCO plant. The number to call is 859-292-6060. Advise the guard that you would like to make a noise complaint. Information will be requested from the caller about the noise so that management can eventually find a solution to remedy as much noise as possible.

Please be patient as we work together with the steel plant to resolve this issue.

ASSISTANT CITY ADMINISTRATOR

As of May 1, the city has an assistant city administrator. Assistant Fire Chief Chuck Norris has a new title. Grants

As you likely know, the City has conducted a study of how best to improve our Parks and Recreation programs. We are now in the process of planning a "make-over" of both Fredricks Landing and Veteran's Memorial Park as well as looking at the best places and ways to extend our bike / walking trails. There are a few grants available for these types of upgrades and we are actively working to apply for these grants.

Road Conditions

If you have traveled up Johns Hill Road, you are keenly aware of the deteriorating condition of parts of that road. The City has made continuous calls to the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet, and in the last newsletter encouraged residents to do the same. On a few occasions their workers have temporarily patched the road, but it has provided little relief to those, including me, who travel that road on a regular basis. Also, the intersection at Licking Pike and I275 continues to be a problem.

In an attempt to address these and other problem areas, I instructed Terry Vance, Wilder City Administrator, to set up a meeting for us with the KY Transportation Cabinet. That meeting is set for May 21st. I will be inviting Campbell County Judge Executive Steve Pendery, State Senator Wil Schroder, and State Representative Dennis Keene to join me in that meeting. I am hopeful our collective voices will lead to action and thus safer travel on our roads in Wilder.
