
Home Use Occupations

Did you know you need to have an occupational license from the city if you operate a business from your home? There are regulations in place within the city zoning ordinance that regulate the use of one's home for business use. Below is the section of the zoning ordinance that regulates home businesses.

SECTION 9.9 SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS GOVERNING HOME OCCUPATIONS: Home occupations shall include the use of a residential structure for services rendered, other than by direct contact with customers, at that location (for example, where the bulk of the business is by telephone - actual work is performed in home and customer is contacted other than at that location). The following requirements shall apply to home occupations, where permitted herein:

- No persons other than members of the family residing on the premises shall be engaged in such operation.
- The use of the dwelling unit for the home occupation shall be clearly incidental and subordinate to its use for residential purposes by its occupants. Not more than twenty–five (25) percent of the gross floor area of any one floor of the dwelling unit (including the basement or cellar) shall be used in the conduct of the home occupation.
- There shall be no change in the outside appearance of the structure or premises, or other visible evidence of the conduct of such home occupation, that will indicate from the exterior that the structure is being utilized, in part, for any purpose other than that of dwelling unit, except that a name plate, as regulated by Article XIV of this ordinance, shall be permitted.
- No home occupation shall be conducted in any accessory structure, nor shall there be any exterior storage of any materials on the premises.
- There shall be no commodity sold upon the premises in connection with such home occupation.
- No traffic shall be generated by such home occupation in greater volumes than would normally be expected in the vicinity where such home occupation is located.
- No equipment or process which creates noise, vibration, glare, fumes, odors, or electrical interference, detectable to the normal senses off the lot, shall be used in such home occupation. In the case of electrical interference, no equipment or process which creates visual or audible interference in any radio or television receivers off the premises, or causes fluctuations in line voltage off the premises, shall be used.

The Wilder Fire Department would like to remind residents to please "Adopt-a-Hydrant" and shovel in front of and around the fire hydrant closest to your home so that firefighters can see and access it. If possible, please clear the snow three feet in all directions and clear the access from the street to make it possible for firefighters to attach hose lines to the hydrant. Seconds count during a fire and the time it takes a firefighter to dig out a buried hydrant could make all the difference in the outcome at a fire.

Firefighters will be checking hydrants and digging them out as needed after the storm, but any assistance residents can provide will be helpful in the event of a fire. We realize that the last thing anyone wants to do after shoveling out their property is to clear more snow, but the extra effort could be life-saving. Thank you.

Did you know that when snow plow drivers are plowing snow down your street that there is sometimes nowhere to put the snow due to vehicles parked on the streets? Please allow our Public Works crew to do the best snow removal job they can. Here are some reminders that will allow for the fastest, safest and most efficient job for our community.

REMINDERS:

PARK CARS IN DRIVEWAY DURING AND/OR AT SNOW AND ICE STORM ADVISORY. This allows streets to be completely cleared and also helps keep the plow from piling snow around parked cars.

CUL-DE-SAC- Do not park in the cul-de-sac during inclement weather. The truck with the snow-plow cannot make turns when cars are parked in the cul-de-sac. Please conform.

PROCEDURE FOR SNOW REMOVAL:

The hilly areas are the first streets to be cleared. We then proceed to clear the level areas. Please note that Three Mile Road, Moock Road, Licking Pike, and Johns Hill Road are state roads and are not maintained by the City of Wilder. TOWN CENTER PLAN

With the completion of the City Wide Comprehensive Plan in early 2019, certain land areas within the city were identified as Special Development Areas. One of those areas is the Town Center. Specifically the "Town Center" area is the part of Licking Pike (state route 9) from Fredericks Landing at the South to the fire station to the North. The plan for this area is to conduct a small area study to determine the highest and best use of land as well as advance the themes resonated throughout the comprehensive plan. Those themes are to Attract, Maintain and Maximize. With the new fire station under construction, the former fire station and other properties acquired by the city over the past several years will be the focus of this special study.

The goal is to attract developers to the area to create a series of mixed development and entertainment uses that will create a true town center along Licking Pike. Now that Licking Pike is complete into Newport providing a much more user friendly link to downtown, the corridor is being traveled more. The plan will establish the basis for future development and position the city for a successful downtown.

The city has engaged the firm of Elevar Design to perform the special study planning for the Town Center. The plan will be introduced to Mayor and Council at the mid-month meeting January 20 at 7:00 p.m. in the city council chambers. After the plan is presented, plans will begin to secure development agreements and improvements.
