# HALLOWEEN FIRE SAFETY TIPS

- When choosing a costume, stay away from long trailing fabric. If your child is wearing a mask, make sure the eye holes are large enough so he or she can see out.
- **Provide children** with flashlights to carry for lighting or glow sticks as part of their costume.
- Dried flowers, cornstalks and crepe paper catch fire easily. Keep all decorations away from open flames and other heat sources like light bulbs and heaters.
- Use a battery-operated candle or glow-stick in jack-o-lanterns. If you use a real candle, use extreme caution. Make sure children are watched at all times when candles are lit. When lighting candles inside jack-o-lanterns, use long, fireplace-style matches or a utility lighter. Be sure to place lit pumpkins well away from anything that can burn and far enough out of the way of trick-or-treaters, doorsteps, walkways and yards.
- Remember to keep exits clear of decorations, so nothing blocks escape routes.
- **Make sure** all smoke alarms in the home are working.
- Tell children to stay away from open flames including jack-o-lanterns with candles in them. Be sure they know how to stop, drop and roll if their clothing catches fire. (Have them practice, stopping immediately, dropping to the ground, covering their face with hands, and rolling over and over to put the flames out.)

If your children are going to **Halloween parties** at others' homes, have them look for ways out of the home and plan how they would get out in an emergency.

# Did you know?



Decorations are the first thing to ignite in 900 reported home fires each year. Two of every five of these fires were started by a candle.

#### FROM THE DESK OF THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR:

#### STREET REPAIR UPDATE:

The city is currently preparing bid specifications for several different street repairs throughout the city. In the past, the city would replace entire streets that needed replaced. For the most part, most of the city streets are in pretty good shape. This year, we are taking a different approach and will be strategically hitting some of the bad spots on several streets. These repairs on only meant to hold off major replacement for a 3 to 5 year timeframe. The bid specifications will also permit the city to apply the unit price on asphalt or concrete to other streets if the contracted price does not exceed what the city has budgeted. Areas on streets are marked with white paint but may need to be expanded during construction.

Currently, portions of the following streets are in the plan to repair:

Town Drive at intersection with AA Highway and Gloria Terrell Drive (by Thornton's) Asphalt Repair.

Guardian Drive. Repairs around catch basins on both sides of the street. Concrete Panel Replacement.

Colonel Pointe Drive. Area around catch basin and in cul de sac. Concrete Panel Replacement.

South Street. Areas in front of fire station to Andrews Way.

Andrews Way. Asphalt from South Street to area being repaired/restored by Water Contactor

St. Johns Lane areas where asphalt has dropped.

Vine Street where asphalt repairs are needed.

Plum Street near intersection of Interstate Entrance Road

Aspen Pines Ct. Intersection with Aspen Pines Drive. Intersection needs repaved.

If there is construction on your street please be patient with the contractors. There will be an inconvenience during construction. Also, please be mindful of workers working in the roadways for their safety. School bus service and garbage collection **will not** be interrupted.

Asphalt repairs can be driven on shortly after pavement work is complete while concrete work takes up to 28 days to reach the full strength. Please so not remove barrels or traffic cones from areas of repair. This should only be done by the contractor. Driving on newly placed concrete may result in premature failure of the repairs.

Finally, the city will be putting a crack sealing contract out to bid for resealing of joints on concrete streets and cracks on asphalt streets. This work may be ongoing through the fall and into spring.

#### Dear Wilder Residents,

I want to take this opportunity to thank you for your support of the many city events the staff diligently plans and organizes. The Kentucky League of Cities said it best, "Community events are a form of tourism. They are incentives to draw people in from outside of Wilder". When people visit our city, they dine at our restaurants, purchase gas at our gas stations and stay at our hotels. Attracting people to the city is economically beneficial to the businesses which in turn benefits the city. Oftentimes, businesses donate money to lessen the cost of an event so we can continue to offer them. The city's parks & recreational activities are important and accent our community.

#### Where did it begin?

The city building was planned to be the heart of the community designed with many uses in mind from civic functions to emergency management services. In the late 90's, former Rep. Jim Callahan procured a \$500,000 grant during its construction specifically for a community center which would offer many recreational events and allow groups to rent and use the lower level hall. He and the city administration, at the time, had an exciting vision for Wilder. Over the past 23 years, the hall & park have served as the location for a number of group meetings, business affairs and enjoyable things for families to do.

#### Fast forward, an aesthetically, beautiful city center park is constructed.

I recall during the design phase of the new fire station, four years ago, discussion around the best use of the remaining land and the need to revitalize the park area. The parks & recreation committee envisioned a number of new amenities to attract more people to the city. The game of pickle ball was the up-and-coming sport transcending all ages. Splash Pads, complete with a concession stand, were becoming more popular for families and kids. The larger rentable shelters for celebratory and festive gatherings perfected the objective. Each amenity was designed for appeal, demand and usage.

#### Why?

The City Center is the "hub" of Wilder. Like other cities, I & the team recognize the importance of recreational activities, useful educative seminars and community-oriented events to the economic vibrancy of our city. Programs like concerts, movie nights, touch-a-truck, MuniciPals Day, petting zoos, fitness classes and informational seminars are becoming more common. Providing these opportunities increases awareness of our city to those in surrounding areas. The indirect, economic benefits of these out-weighs the nominal costs. Using a cost-versus-benefit analysis will always be the standard.

A vibrant, active city provides value in many ways. For example, municipal revenues grow in a stimulated environment. Talented applicants for jobs abound when there is a diverse range of indoor and outdoor activities. And businesses appreciate the exposure.

Your participation at the events and enthusiastic support of the programs are deeply appreciated by me, council and the entire staff. We work in concert to offer the finest events for the benefit of the community.
