SNOW & ICE REMOVAL

REMINDERS:

PARK VEHICLE IN DRIVEWAY DURING AND/OR AT SNOW AND ICE STORM ADVISORY. This allows streets to be completely cleared and also helps keep the plow from piling snow around parked cars.

CUL-DE-SAC—Do not park in the cul-de-sac during inclement weather. The truck with the snowplow cannot make turns when cars are parked in the cul-de-sac. Please conform.

PROCEDURE FOR SNOW REMOVAL:

The hilly areas are the first streets to be cleared. We then proceed to clear the level areas. Please note that Three Mile Road, Moock Road, Licking Pike, and Johns Hill Road are state roads and are not maintained by the City of Wilder. If you have a problem or questions regarding these roads, please call the Kentucky Department of Transportation at 859-341-2700.

Public Works

ON STREET PARKING

Recently the city has been receiving a lot of calls concerning parking on city streets. Below are a few of the rules and regulations regarding City of Wilder Ordinances about on street parking.

- Parking in excess of 72 hours in one location is prohibited. (Cannot leave vehicle parked in one location for more than three days)
- No parking in areas marked with yellow paint
- All vehicles must be registered and operable if parked on city streets. (Valid license/registration required and vehicle must be running and able to move under own power)
- Parking must be in the same direction of travel. (No parking the opposite way on streets)
- Obey no parking signs. (Most streets only permit parking on one side of the street. The streets are marked as to which side of the street parking is permitted)
- Be courteous to your neighbors and the mail carriers. (While this is not in the ordinances it becomes a problem when mailboxes are blocked and people park too close or even block neighbor's driveways. Parking in and around cul-de-sacs can also pose problems for larger vehicles especially school buses and fire trucks/ambulance)

The city is in the process of evaluating all city streets for parking issues including missing signs, parking violations etc. Please let us know if you have any particular parking issues, concerns or complaints. Call the city building at 859-581-8884.





Every year, thousands of Marines, their families, and local communities work together to spread holiday cheer to children in need through the Marine Corps Reserve's Toys for Tots Program. The organization was founded in 1947 when Marine Corps Reserve Major (Maj) Bill Hendricks was asked by his wife to deliver handcrafted dolls that she made to an agency that helped children in need. When they could not find any organization, they decided to create one. Within the first year, they donated 5,000 toys to children in need all over Los Angeles, Calif., where Maj Hendricks' Marine Corps Reserve unit was located. It has since grown across the United States.

The way it works is that businesses or govt. organizations can volunteer to be a drop-off location for the community. The campaign ends Dec 9. On that day a representative from the 14th Marine Regiment Communications Company will collect the boxes and the toys will be moved to a location nearby where they are sorted out by age group and prepared to be handed out. If you are wondering what to donate, Wilder's Officer Ryan Miller volunteered with Lima Co in Columbus, OH in 2019 and has seen everything from puzzles to hoverboards being donated.

For donations, anyone can drop off new toys In their manufacturer's packaging in the box at the Fire department or the entrance to the City Building. Monetary donations can also be made online at the Toys for Tots website. Generally, donations should be made with children under 12 in mind.



Get Ahead of the Winter Freeze It's not too early to begin preparing for the heating season. Check these 10 tips off your list and get ahead of the winter freeze. Our furnace has been inspected and serviced by a qualified professional during the last 12 months. (A furnace should be serviced at least once a year.) Our chimneys and vents have been cleaned and inspected by a qualified professional. I have checked for creosote built-up. (Not cleaning your chimney is the leading cause of

- Our wood for our fireplace or wood stove is **dry, seasoned wood**.
- Our fireplace screen is metal or heat-tempered glass, in good condition and secure in its position in front of the fireplace.

chimney fires from built up creosote. This service needs to be done at least once a year.)

- We have a **covered metal container** ready to use to dispose cooled ashes. (The ash container should be kept at least 10 feet from the home and any nearby buildings.)
- Our children know to stay at least **3 feet away** from the fireplace, wood/pellet stove, oil stove or other space heaters.
- Our portable space heaters have an automatic shut-off.
- Our portable space heaters will be **plugged directly into an outlet** (not an extension cord) and placed at least three feet from anything that can burn; like bedding, paper, walls, and even people. (Place notes throughout your home to remind you to turn off portable heaters when you leave a room or go to bed.)
- We have tested our smoke alarms and made sure they are working. (You need smoke alarms on every level of the home, inside each sleeping room and outside each separate sleeping area. For the best protection, the smoke alarms should be interconnected so when one sounds, they all sound.)
- We have tested our carbon monoxide alarms and made sure they are working. (Carbon monoxide alarms should be located outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home.)

Home fires occur more in winter than in any other season. As you stay cozy and warm this winter season, be fire smart!



Half of all home heating fires occur in the months of December January and February.



Heating equipment is involved in 1 in every 7 reported home fires and 1 in every 5 home fire deaths.



Keep anything that can burn at least 3 feet from any heat source like fireplaces, wood stoves, radictors or space heaters.



Keep portable generators outside, away from windows, and as far away as possible from your home.



Install and test carbon monoxide alarms at least once a month.



Plug only 1 heat-producing appliance (such as a space heater) into an electrical outlet at a time.



Have a qualified professional clean and inspect your chimney and vents every year.



Store cooled ashes in a tightly covered metal container, and keep it outside at least 10 feet from your home and any nearby buildings.

From the Desk of City Administrator

IMPORTANT TRASH/RECYCLING COLLECTION INFORMATION

While this article only affects about half of the residents and a few businesses in the city, it does have some very important information about upcoming trash/recycling collection changes.

The solid waste contract for the city with Rumpke expires on December 31, 2023. The city has had Rumpke trash collection for the last six years. Bids were received on August 2 and approved by city council at the August 7 council meeting. Best Way Waste Collection was the lowest and best bid so they will become Wilder's new trash/recycling collection contractor beginning January 2024.

Following are some important things to know:

- Collection day remains Tuesday each week for waste and recycling.
- Cans should be placed at the curb the night before.
- The contract calls for the driver to return the cart as close to the place the resident placed the cart for collection. The cart shall not be placed in the driveway to impede a vehicle from entering the driveway.
- Start times can be as early as 6:00 a.m.
- Everyone will receive one 95 gallon cart for trash and one 64 gallon cart for recycling.
- Additional carts (for a fee) are available by contacting Best Way.
- Rumpke final collection on Tuesday December 26. May be delayed one day due to holiday.
- Rumpke will be collecting Rumpke carts that day or the final week of December.
- Best Way will be delivering carts on December 20 which should take two days.
- Everyone should have a Best Way cart prior to the state of Best Way's collection.
- Best Way's first collection will be January 2. May be delayed one day due to New Year Holiday.
- The new contract with Best Way is for 3 years with the possibility of 3 option years.
- The rules for what is acceptable to place out for collection is the same.
- The rules for what is acceptable to place out for recycling is the same.

We expect the business of dropping of and picking up trash and recycling carts will run smoothly, however, this transition won't be without some disruption and confusion. One of the reasons Best Way is dropping of carts early is to make sure everyone has their carts prior to the first of the year. If you do not receive your cart(s) please contact the city building at 859-581-8884 or Best Way at 859-372-4900.

This is the first time the city will be using Best Way. We hope the service received is professional and mutually beneficial to the city, the waste customers in the city and Best Way. Moving forward all questions about trash/recycling collection should be directed to the city building.

From the Desk of the Mayor

By now, you should have received your city property tax bill. For most of you, your 2023-2024 tax bill should be the same as the tax rate didn't change from last year's, 2022-2023 rate. As Mayor, I prepared a conservative budget based on those rates. As it is councils' role to adopt the budget, I anticipated they would elect to hold to those rates & I wanted an achievable budget based on that assumption. Only those who have curbside waste/recycling saw a nominal, \$6.50 increase for these services. January 1, 2024, the city will begin a new, three-year contract with Best Way for the waste/recycling services. Although a slight, pass-thru cost adjustment, keeping Rumpke would have resulted in a \$70.00 per year, per household increase for waste collection. Best Way won the bid.

In the spirit of transparency, I want to take this opportunity to explain how the tax process works. All Wilder properties (real and tangible) are assessed by the Campbell County Property Valuation Office. Each year, the city receives a tax roll of those values. The annual tax roll is then sent to the Northern Kentucky Area Development District (NKADD) for calculations of the tax rates they determine are needed to sustain the revenues & maintain city operations. While the formula for calculating the tax rate for both real & tangible (inventory, machinery, equipment, etc.) property is very complicated, once the rates are set by NKADD & received by the city, it becomes the responsibility of council to decide what rates to adopt according to Kentucky Statute.

OPTIONS 2023-2024

- Accept the NKADD suggested 2023-2024 compensating rate.
- Accept the NKADD suggested 2023-2024 comp rate plus 4% (requires a public hearing).
- Vote to adopt any rate below the NKADD 2023-2024 compensating rates.

PROPERTY TAX RATES 2023-2024

- Compensating rate from the NKADD: \$2.70/\$1000 of valuation.
- Compensating rate plus 4%: \$2.80/\$1000 of valuation. This rate is capped by Kentucky State Law.
- Adopt any rate below these two rates. <u>The city adopted the same 2022-2023 rate of \$2.31/\$1,000 in valuation.</u>

BUSINESS TANGIBLE TAX RATES FOR 2023-2024

• Compensating Rate \$7.96/\$1,000 of valuation.

\$796 for every \$100,000 in value.

• Compensating Rate plus 4% \$8.27/\$1,000 of valuation.

\$827 for every \$100,000 in value.

• 2022 Rate of \$5.13/\$1,000 of valuation.

\$531 for every \$100,000 in value.

Adopt any rate below NKADD rate. The city adopted the same 2022-2023 rate of \$5.31/\$1,000.

As you can see, not only do the businesses pay a real property tax but most pay a sizable tangible property tax on top of that. It is important to remember how vital they are to our economic resiliency. One final thought, if you find yourself struggling to pay your tax bill, please contact our city clerk/treasurer to make some type of payment arrangement. The city offers this process as a courtesy to keep those in need from falling behind.
